Trooper's Story

Last winter was challenging for Jerry Tobin. The West Yarmouth man was struggling with his finances and was in poor health. Then his beloved companion, Trooper, a pit bull/basset hound mix that Jerry had rescued from an abusive situation, required veterinary care. Knowing that treatment would cost money he simply didn't have, Jerry was forced to make a difficult and drastic decision. He brought Trooper to the Cape Animal Referral and Emergency Center (CARE) in South Dennis, MA, and asked that

"I didn't think I could care for him,"

Jerry recalled. "I didn't know what else to do."

Trooper be euthanized.

"The owner was distressed, at the end of the line," said William Kaser, DVM, the emergency room veterinarian on duty at the time. "I was told that a man had brought in a dog to be put to sleep. Unfortunately, we get a lot of those," he continued. "The owner didn't have the money to care for the dog and wanted to make the best decision for him."

Jerry said that when he rescued Trooper in 2001, he noticed that the dog had a small growth on his back. A neighborhood kid told him Trooper had been shot with a BB gun; a BB had lodged under the dog's skin. A vet examined the growth and told Jerry it was okay not to remove it. Doing what dogs do, eventually Trooper chewed at the growth and the BB fell out. The area became infected and required medical attention, which is when Jerry went to CARE.

Although the area was bleeding, Dr. Kaser was not overly alarmed. "It is not a big deal in our business," he said. "Trooper was a nice dog, and I could see the bond between him

and his owner. I didn't feel good about euthanizing this dog. I said to Jerry, 'Why don't we see if we can find someone to help?' So we kept Trooper at CARE and made some calls."

Kaser explained, "but he was having a tough time. Afterwards he said he couldn't believe that he talked about doing this to the dog."

"The guy was trying to do the right thing," Dr.

In fact, the next day Jerry had second thoughts. He called CARE, hoping Trooper was still alive. Fortunately, he was!

"I was not thinking straight," said Jerry. "I was really sick. But when I called back, someone at CARE said there are people who can help and told me about The Sampson Fund. I said, 'I'm all for anything you can do.""

Jerry applied to The Sampson Fund for Veterinary Care, which agreed to help him and Trooper.

The Fund was able to donate a little more than half the cost to surgically remove the benign tumor from Trooper's back. Dr. Kaser called this a rewarding case. "Sometimes you put down four or five dogs a day, which is really hard. But we saved a dog's life. On my end, it's nice to have a resource like The Sampson Fund for these special cases and for people in desperate situations. Trooper is a great dog and his owner really wanted to do the right thing. It's good to be able to help and preserve their relationship."

Trooper, now 13, is healthy and happy, according to Jerry. "He's got it good. In fact, he's got it better than I do...he's certainly got a more comfortable bed!

"He's the best dog you could ever imagine," Jerry continued. "He's a lover and a great companion. He's smart and friendly to everyone. He loves kids, loves people. I am so grateful for this help. It was awesome."


