SHOESTRING THEORY



Marleigh, a one-and-a-half-year-old black cat, was in trouble. He had been vomiting a thin brown liquid for several days. Emily Renaud, Marleigh's owner, had been employed by Pleasant Bay Animal Hospital in Harwich for three years. From her work as a veterinary technician, she knew from the color and consistency of what she saw that something was very wrong. When she fed Marleigh, he would eat but immediately throw up. She suspected her young cat had ingested something that was causing his distress.

"Marleigh likes to chew on things so I was concerned that he had eaten something, but I had no idea what it could have been," said Emily, who lives in Yarmouth. "Then he threw up something that could have been part of a hair elastic or a piece of string. When that happened, I thought 'that's it' and figured he would be back to normal. But the next day he threw up a huge clump. So then I thought that was it. By the third day he still wasn't getting better. And he was starting to get wobbly and weak."

Emily brought Marleigh to Pleasant Bay Animal Hospital, where X-rays revealed that something was indeed stuck. Whatever it was was in his intestines, and it would have to be removed surgically, which would cost over \$1,000.

"There was no way we could afford it," said Emily, who had given birth to her first child a month earlier. "We were living on one income. It was bad timing. We would have had to put him to sleep, sad to say."



Because of her employment at Pleasant Bay, Emily was familiar with The Sampson Fund for Veterinary Care; she decided to apply for financial assistance to help with the cost of Marleigh's operation. "We were so lucky that The Sampson Fund was able to help. I'm really grateful, because otherwise we wouldn't have been able to do the surgery."

The mystery object was successfully removed although it was never identified. "It seemed to be some kind of string. We thought it might have been a shoelace, but none of our shoes are missing laces," she said. One thing they know for certain is that Marleigh is doing great. "He wouldn't stop purring when he got home. And he's like a different cat. He was always shy and would hide behind the couch. Now he's not so shy." He is also happily reunited with the family's other cat, Cassius.

"They are best friends," Emily said. "When Marleigh was so sick, Cassius would clean him."

Although the family may never know what Marleigh ate, they don't want him ingesting any other potentially dangerous objects. "He used to like to sleep in our closet and we had a little bed in there for him," Emily explained. "But not anymore. We now have a lock on the closet."
