Eight More Lives?

Those of us who have pets know how much some animals adore chewing stuff. Usually it's not a major problem...well, okay, chewing your grandmother's priceless Oriental carpet might be an issue. But chewing typically results in a scolding for the animal (and hopefully a repair for the rug).

Sometimes, however, errant chewing can result in more serious problems...unfortunately, more for the chewer than the chewee. That was the recent scenario for Miko, a one-and-a-half year old male cat owned by Matthew Woods of East Falmouth. Matthew, who has two other cats, said he arrived home one day and saw his other cats, but he didn't see Miko.

"I was getting ready to go out," Matthew recalled, "when Miko came strolling by with a ball of string hanging from his mouth. I tried to gently pull it out of his mouth but the string wouldn't come out. When Miko started crying, I knew something was wrong."

Matthew's girlfriend called Falmouth Animal Hospital and was told to bring Miko in, which they did right away. X-rays uncovered the problem: Miko had ingested the string. Although the vet couldn't tell how long the string was, it didn't matter. It had already worked its way into the cat's small intestine.

Surgery had to be performed



to remove the string from Miko's innards. But the cost was an issue for Matthew, who works as a baker and pizza maker. Falmouth Animal Hospital, which is a member of The Sampson Fund For Veterinary Care, told Matthew about the fund. He applied for financial assistance and was accepted.

Miko underwent successful surgery to remove the string and is doing fine. "It was very scary though," Matthew added, "and could have been a lot worse. The vet said if a couple more hours had gone by, probably nothing could have been done to save him."

Having used up one of his nine lives, the double-pawed cat

that Matthew describes as "very affectionate and energetic" is back to his "rambunctious self," according to his owner. He's chasing the two older cats around the house, but one thing he's not doing is chewing string.

"I've owned a few cats but have never experienced anything like this before," Matthew added. "The doctor said Miko wouldn't learn anything from this, so I went through the whole house and threw away everything that could possibly cause another problem.

"I'm really thankful to The Sampson Fund. I was amazed to find out that there was something like this available to help out."
